The assumption here is that peace is not just a state of affairs created by a diplomatic agreement and by the political and legal structures that it puts into place. Institutionalization of a process of problem solving must meet several conditions if it is to contribute effectively to transforming the relationship between the former enemies and help lay the basis for positive peace.
